Mr. Lakirovich has wide experience as a solo, chamber, and orchestral violinist, and as a conductor of youth symphonies, chamber orchestras, and choirs. He has taught extensively in the USSR, Israel, Germany, Australia, and the United States, and was the Co-founder and Principal of the Stoliarsky School of Music in Brisbane and Sydney, Australia.

The Lucy Moses Chamber Orchestra is an ensemble for young people from the Lucy Moses School for Music and Dance. A not-for-profit organization founded in 1952, the Kaufman Center occupies its own facility, the award-winning Abraham Goodman House, located on West 67th Street. The Empire Brass enjoys an international reputation as North America's finest brass quintet, renowned for its brilliant virtuosity and the unparalleled diversity of its repertoire. The five musicians – all of whom have held leading positions with major American orchestras – perform over 100 concerts a year, in cities like New York, Boston, Chicago, Washington, London, Zurich, and Tokyo. They made a debut tour of China during the 1999-2000 season. Their discography is considerable, and their best selling records on the Telarc label have introduced an even larger worldwide audience to the excitement of brass music ranging from Bach and Handel to jazz and Broadway. The Empire Brass is the first brass ensemble to win the Walter W. Naumburg International Competition in 1976. Rolf Smedvig, one of the world's great trumpeters and a dazzling musician of international renown founded the ensemble. Marc Reese joined the ensemble in 1996 having studied at Juilliard and the New England Conservatory of Music. Gregory Miller joined in 1997, after serving as principal horn with the Honolulu Symphony. He trained at the Oberlin Conservatory of Music, Boston University and with the New World Symphony. Mark Hetzler studied at Boston University, the New England Conservatory of Music and with the New World Symphony. He was formerly principal trombone with the Florida West Coast Symphony and he is a talented arranger of music. Kenneth Amis studied at Boston University and the New England Conservatory of Music. A composer, arranger and noted for his transcriptions Amis holds the International Brass Chair at the Royal Academy of Music, and he has performed as a soloist with the English Chamber Orchestra, among other honors.
